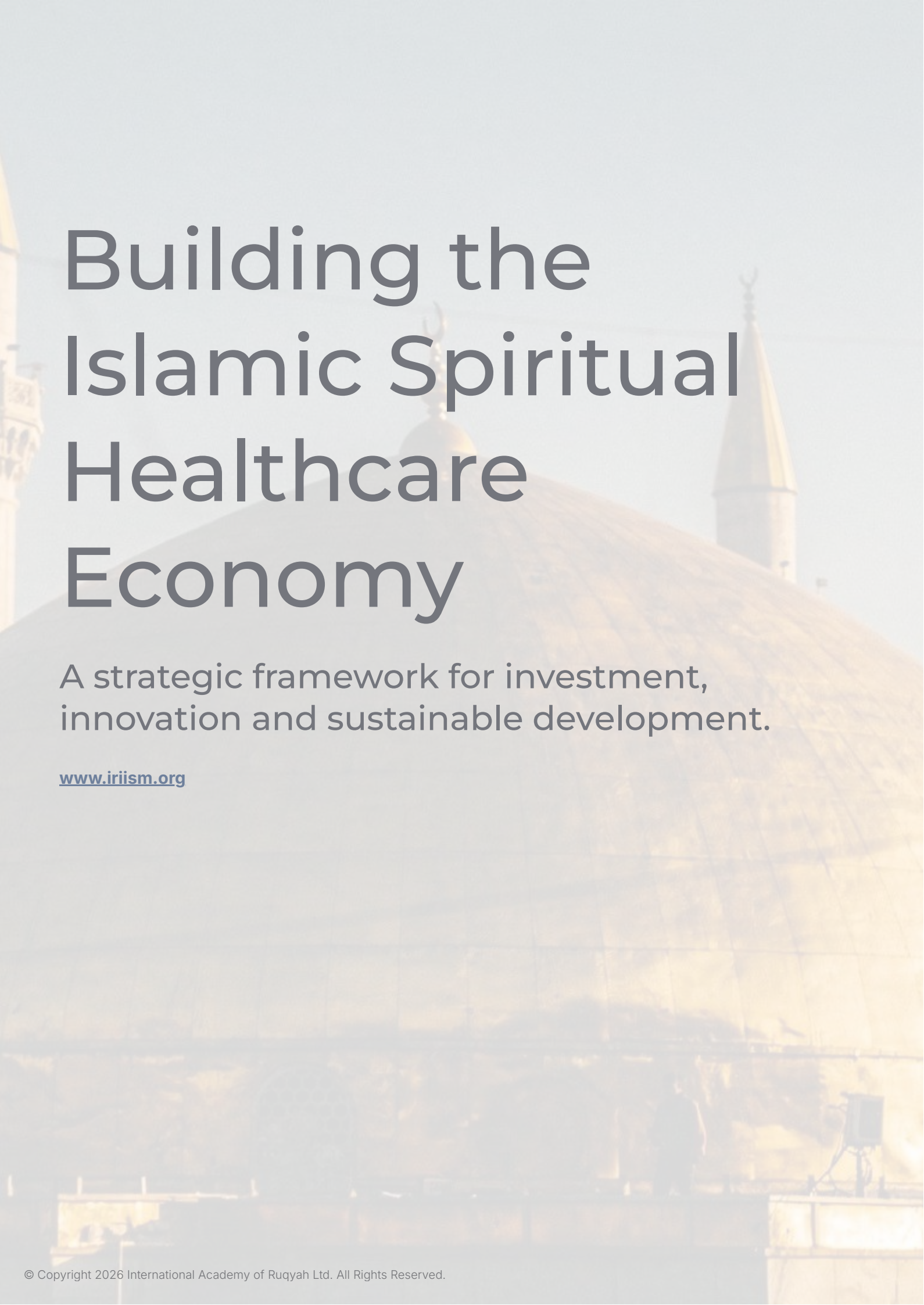

History demonstrates that successful healthcare professions extend far beyond clinical practice.

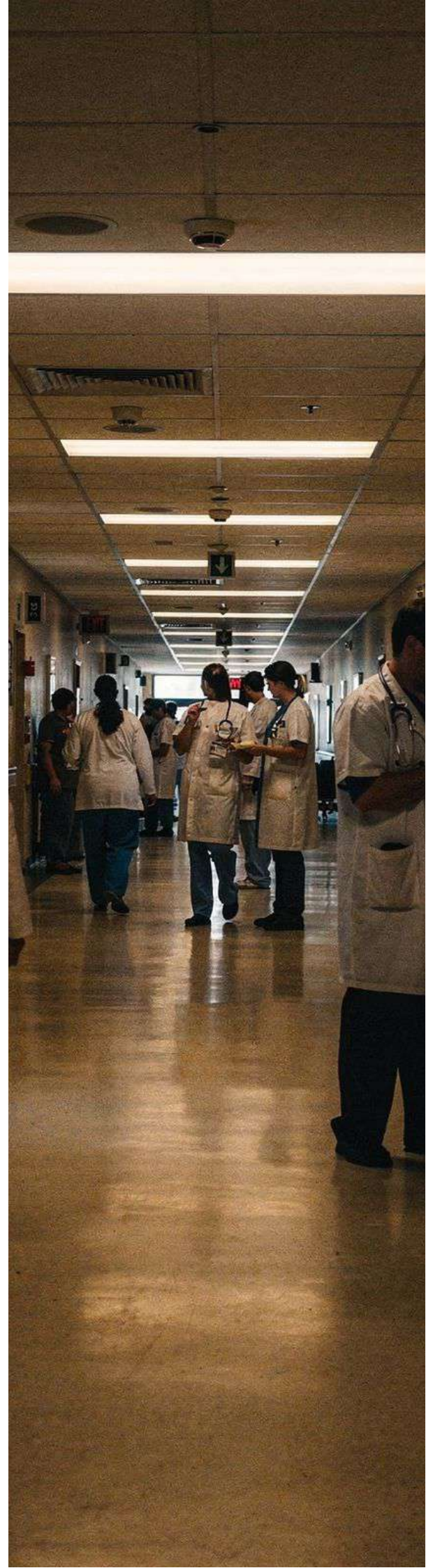
Medicine supports:

Islamic Spiritual Medicine has the opportunity to develop similar intellectual assets that benefit healthcare internationally.

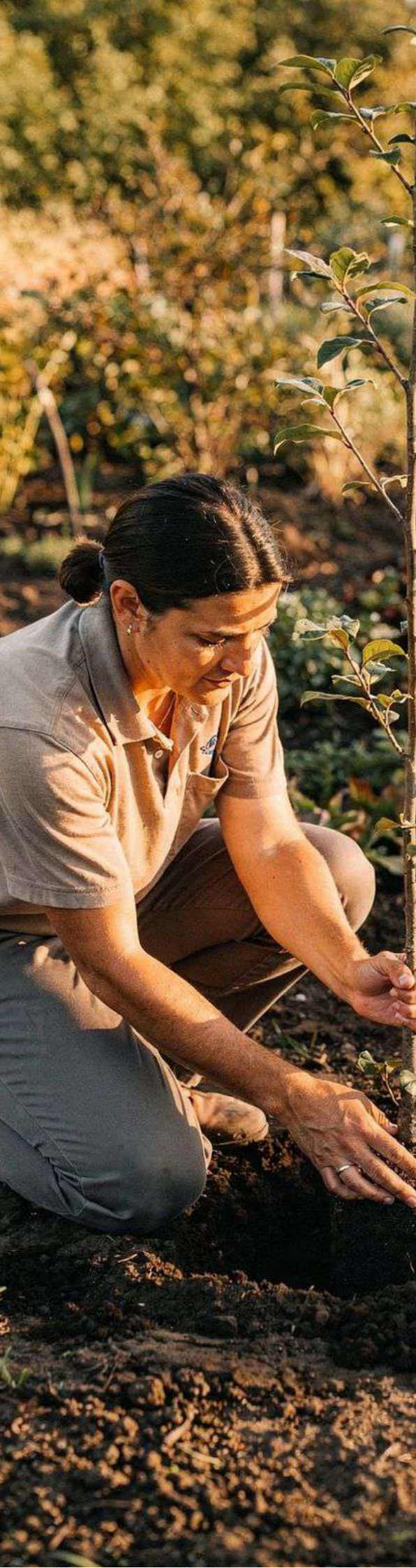
A Diverse Healthcare Economy

The Clinical Services Sector

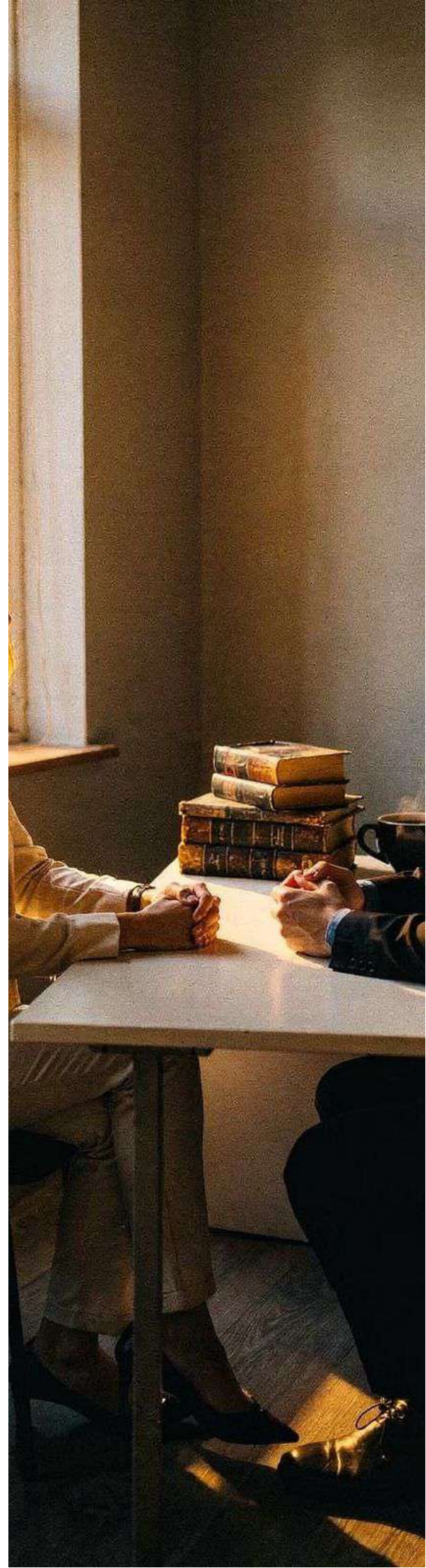
Clinical care remains the foundation of the healthcare economy. Patients seek services because they require support, treatment and guidance.

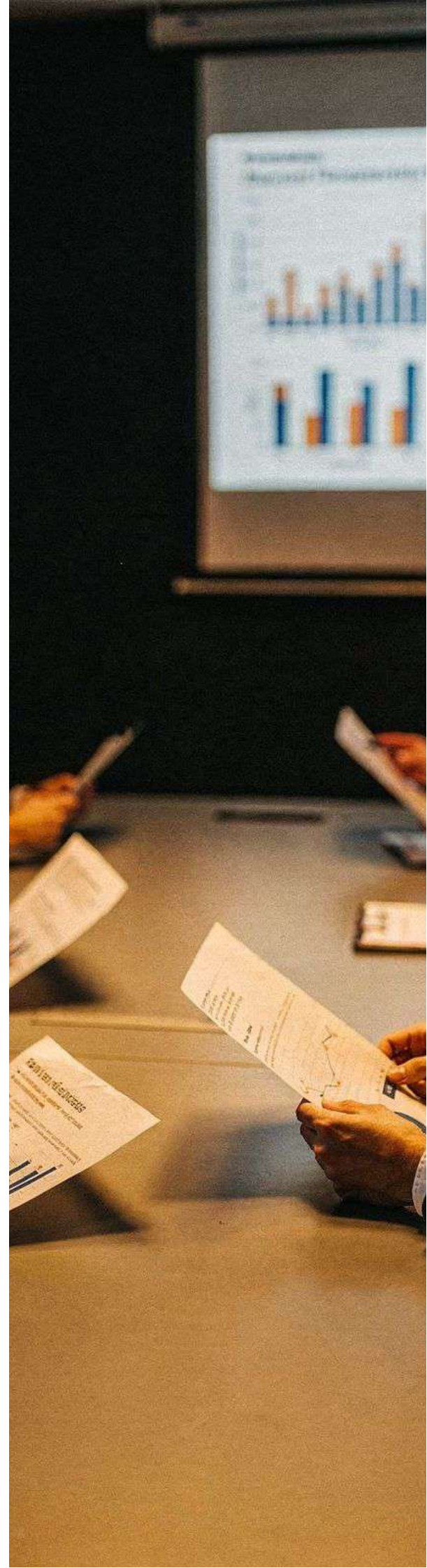
A Mixed Funding Model

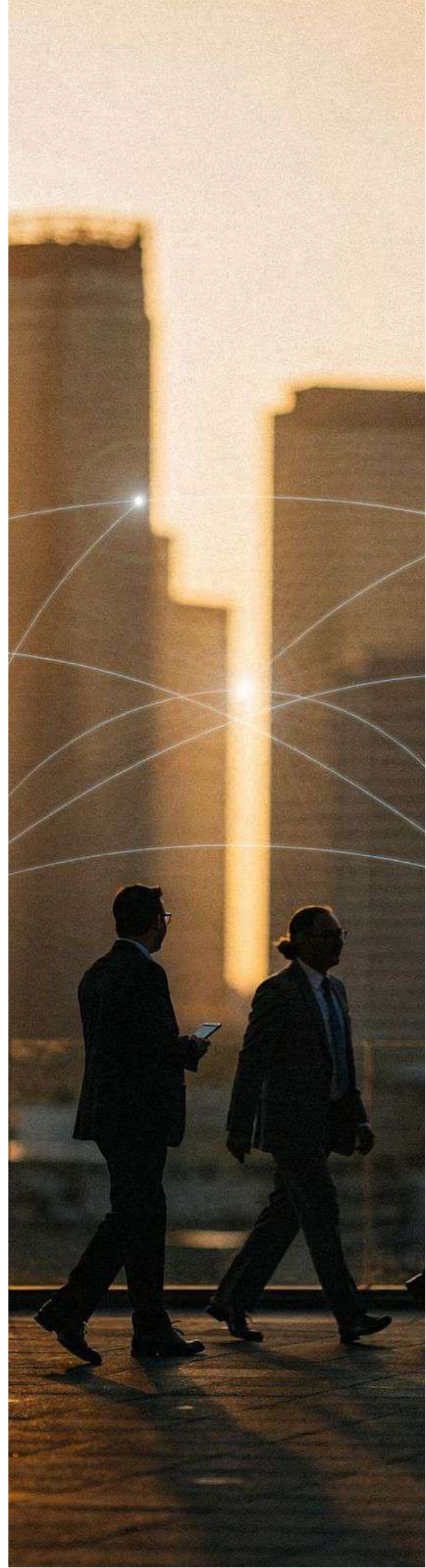
Part 10 – A Vision for the Future
